Challenge: “ Spatial planning was not in the position to react on the socioeconomic changes of the last 20 – 30 years. So how should spatial planning take into account unknown changes of the future?”

- **Position of spatial planning**
- Regional/ national spatial planning should be strengthened
- A very strong position of communal spatial planning is in danger to be dominated by individual interests of private persons
- A clear legal framework is necessary



Working Group 3: Natural Hazards and Spatial Planning

- **Interdisciplinary cooperation**
- Officials for natural hazards and spatial planning are separated in different administrations, often sectoral thinking is dominating
- “Everybody knows, what **the others** should do”
- Interdisciplinary cooperation and broad communication is essential
